Pupil Premium Grant Expenditure: 2019-2020

At Saint Thomas' C of E Academy we have high aspirations and ambitions for our children and we believe that no child should be left behind. We strongly believe that it is not about where you come from but your passion and thirst for knowledge, and your dedication and commitment to learning that make the difference between success and failure, and we are determined to ensure that our children are given every chance to realise their full potential. Pupil premium funding represents a significant proportion of our budget and we are committed to ensuring it is spent to maximum effect.

We believe that one of the biggest barriers for children can be poverty of expectation and so are determined to create a climate that does not limit a child's potential in any way

The school is located in an area of social deprivation and have an increasing number of children are eligible for FSM, which brings some challenges. The number of pupils eligible for Free School Meals is increasing year on year .However, staff are committed to ensuring that these challenges are mitigated so that all pupils can reach their full potential. We believe there is no "one size fits all" so it is essential that we identify individual barriers in order to provide personalised targeted support so that our children can flourish.

When making decisions about using pupil premium funding it is important to consider the context of the school and the subsequent challenges faced. Common barriers for FSM children can be less support at home, weak language and communication skills, lack of confidence, more frequent behaviour difficulties, and attendance and punctuality issues. There may also be complex family situations that prevent children from flourishing. The challenges are varied and there is no "one size fits all".

Our key objective in using the Pupil Premium Grant is to narrow the gap between pupil groups. Through targeted interventions we are working to eliminate barriers to learning and progress. For children who start school with low attainment on entry, our aim is to ensure that they make accelerated progress in order to at least reach age related expectations + as they move through the school.

We analyse our data thoroughly, examine the impact of current interventions and have make use of a range of research to inform our decision making

This year our aim is to continue to increase:

• Continue to transform the curriculum creating challenging, exciting and engaging learning for all groups of children. We aim to offer pupils much wider extra-curricular experiences funded by the school. We have organised a number of outside organisations to visit school to widen the experiences of all pupils, but particularly those of our most disadvantaged pupils.

- Develop the range of clubs we offer pupils so that they can engage in out of school activities to enrich their experiences and help them to foster enjoyment of a wider range of activities. Pupil Premium children should be provided with experiences to enable them to develop as a whole in all areas of the curriculum and SMSC. They should be supported both academically and in terms of their emotional health and well-being.
- Support the development of quality first wave teaching through CPD and ensure that specific funded interventions are in place to support Pupil Premium Children with the acquisition of specific skills.
- Narrow the gap in terms of attainment and progress for Pupil Premium children verses none-Pupil premium children.

Training for staff this year on supporting the range of SEND needs in school. We will be focusing on the development of our curriculum for Foundation Subjects and developing staff knowledge in ICT. We will be supporting staff with safeguarding training. In addition to this we will be providing additional support for staff to develop in their personal roles to support all our pupils so they can achieve the highest possible standards in all areas of their learning
